ALL ABOUT SALEP...

Bruce and Kathy Weber just returned from Turkey, and they told us lots about their trip at the meeting. They brought back packets of Salep, a drink that is common all over the world and is made with orchids. In 2008, I wrote an article for ORCHID DIGEST on salep, and I was excited to actually see it. Salep refers to the paired underground tubers found in several orchid genera including ORCHIS and OPHRYS. The tubers are dried and ground into a powdery flour, mixed with milk and sugar, and used in a popular hot drink and an even more popular ice cream (that comes in 32 flavors...), both called "salep." The name "salep" comes from an Arabic expression shortened to "sahlab" and the Hebrew "sakhlav," which means "fox testicles," a graphic description of the shape of the orchid tubers. In 50 AD, Dioscorides, a Greek writer, wrote that if something looked like a body part, it was good for curing that body part. Because of what these orchid roots look like, they have been used for centuries as an aphrodisiac, an early from of Viagra. It is still regarded today as an effective and desirable aphrodisiac for men. The Webers told us that they had searched for and found "dondurma," the Turkish word for ice cream. Good salep ice cream, made from orchid tubers, is so thick it needs to be eaten with a knife and fork. The ice cream does not melt, and it is so elastic that you can jump rope with it. The ice cream comes in many exotic flavors including apricot, pistachio, red current and peach. Eric Hansen, author, says that the flavor has a "hint of mushrooms, yak butter or goats on a rainy day." Bruce said it tasted good. The tremendous demand for these orchids is putting pressure on the plants. The leading salep ice cream maker in Istanbul uses three tons of salep or about 12 million orchid plants a year. The BBC reports in 2003 that several rare orchid species found in Turkey face extinction bevause of the Turkish love of the ice cream. Export is not permitted, but there is no plan to cut back on orchid harvesting within the country. Now, the flowers are more difficult to find, and orchid harvesters must travel higher in the mountains to find them.




VISITING OUR NATIVE ORCHIDS


On Saturday, April 30th, our club met at the Red Springs Picnic Area of Calico Basin to see our native orchid, *Epipactis* gigantea in glorious bloom. On an absolutely perfect day, Paula Garrett, our Nevada native orchid guru, took us on a lovely walk where we saw hundreds of our native orchid growing against moist red rocks as well as scores of beautiful wildflowers. Our lucky group included Roberta Schechter, Ole Borresen, Carol Siegel, Jeanne Tinsman and her husband, Claudia Drake, Sherry Byrnes, and Wanda and Bruce LaFollette, as well as two of Claudia's friends and two dogs. It was glorious! This is the easiest of our 14 native orchids to see. It is found in First Creek, La Madre Spring, Ash Spring, Pine Creek, Icebox Canyon, Blue Diamond, the Spring Mountain Ranch and Sandstone Spring. Its lip quivers in the breeze, and it is called the Chatterbox Orchid. It loves little streams and wet areas.

In other years, our club has gone to Mt. Charleston to see *Platanthera sparsiflora*, now thought to be P. tescamnis, a close relative. Several years, we trekked to Ash Springs near Death Valley to participate in an orchid count of Spiranthes infernalis, which only grows there and nowhere else in the world. Thrillingly, in 2005, the club went on an orchid hunt for Spiranthes diluvialis which had been lost in Nevada since the 1930's. WE FOUND IT AGAIN in Panaca in Lincoln County and I wrote up our discovery in the NATIVE ORCHID JOURNAL. We were famous! Congratulations poured in from as far away as Borneo!
