

EPIPACTIS GIGANTEA IN BLOOM IN CALICO BASIN

On Sunday, April 21, a hardy band of orchid club adventurers accompanied naturalist Paula Garrett on a nature walk in Calico Basin to see our native orchid Epipactis gigantea. What a glorious day we had! Under sunny skies, over 25 of our orchid-loving members explored the native vegetation and wildflowers including amsonia, astragalus, hedgehog cactus, native ash, desert marigold, blue-eyed grass, yucca, Indian paintbrush and penstemon- and many more.(And they say this is a desert!) As we neared the cool, shady, wet sandstone cliffs, we thrilled to thousands of our native orchid in bloom. We even saw a syrphid fly carrying orchid pollinia (captured by Claudia Drake above in an amazing photo) and flying to deposit it on another orchid. That was truly a first!! Sometimes known as the "Stream Orchid" because of its moist habitat, this native loves to grow in wet places from sea level to 7500 feet, where it is found in hot springs, road cuts and wet cliff faces. It occurs all over Las Vegas where there is a little water- First Creeek, LaMadre Spring, Pine Creek, Icebox Canyon, Blue Diamond, etc. It even grew in a puddle under a leaky water fountain at UNLV. The plant blooms to about 3 feet high with 12-20 flowers per inflorescence. The flowers are about 11/2 to 2 inches across. Part of the lip is elongated and quivers in the breeze, earning it its other name, the "Chatterbox Orchid." We thank Paula for her expert instruction and her generosity in leading us on her day off. We are excited to welcome Harry Phillips of Andy's Orchids (<u>www.andysorchids.com</u>) who will be doing a talk on the perception and reality of growing orchids

In Harry's words:

The purpose of my talk is to share what I have learned during the 35 or so years I have been associated with and growing orchids, the do's and don't of growing orchids, because what it seems like is not always the case with orchids. Have everyone bring there questions, and we should have a fun time. This will be an open forum discussion.

Harry Phillips was born in San Diego, California on July 9, 1953. His Father taught him to appreciate plants at an early age. In January of 1963 Harry's brother Andy (of Andy's Orchids fame) was born, and six years later is when it all started. They were both exposed to exotic plants and flowers at an early age, but when Andy became interested and latter obsessed with orchids, Harry some how resisted becoming involved with them for as long as he could. He assisted Andy in his passion by building his first two green houses, and Andy would reward him with a hybrid that was in bloom, tell him to bring it back when it goes out of bloom, and exchange it for one in bloom. Well this would only last about a year until he decided that he wanted to keep one and get it to re-bloom, the beginning of the end.

In 1986 Harry, with his soon to be wife Leslie moved with Andy and his orchid collection to Encinitas, California. Being constantly exposed to all of Andy's orchids was beginning to have an effect on Harry. Shortly after, Andy left for four months for Costa Rica, and placed Harry in charge of the collection. When Andy returned he found that Harry had not killed too many plants and managed to become even more addicted. Andy now, feeling more confident about leaving his orchid collection under Harry's care, began to plan a cycling trip through South America which ended up lasting two years. After that it was all over for Harry, he was completely addicted to orchids.

Harry assisted Andy part time, with the beginnings of Andy's Orchids, for 10 years while holding a fulltime job to pay the mortgage, going full time in November of 1998. His passion in orchids is in the Genera Sobralia and Elleanthus, but you ask him at any particular time of the year which is his favorite orchid, it will most likely be the one or ones in bloom at that time. He has traveled in Mexico the Caribbean, Ecuador and Fiji viewing orchids in the wild. Harry believes that growing epiphytic orchids the way they grow in nature is best and the orchids seem to agree. He will share with you his experiences with the perceptions and realities of growing orchids, and would like to dispel the fantasy that growing orchids is difficult.
