What fun we had at our June meeting as Fred Clarke delighted us with a wide-streen presentation on the weird and irful world of Cycnoches, tums, Mormodes and Clowesia. His prioros of these beauties were fabulous



and, as always, he humbled all of us with his vast store of information. His mantra for these deciduous (losing their leaves) orchids was to WAIT, WAIT before resuming watering after their dormant period.

As Fred summarized:

1.As the new growth develops, wait to irrigate until the new roots are developed and are 3-to-5 inches long. Don't be in a hurry to water. It is better to wait.

2.Irrigate and fertilize frequently while, the plants are in active growth.

3.Stop fertilization and reduce irrigation by ½ by mid-November.

4.Cease watering by the 1st of January.

Fred, owner of Sunset Valley Orchids, treated us to sales of his inexpensive and lovely orchids.

Clarice Dean presented the Species of the Month,

Cycnoches warscewiczii, which she amazingly could pronounce. This easy-growing epiphyte (grows on trees),like other Cycnoches, can be found from sea level to 1800 feet in hot lowlands of Mexico, Central America and the Amazon Basin. The name "cycnoches"

means "swan's neck" referring to the shape of the flower which resembles the body of a swan. Interestingly, this species can produce separate male and female flowers. During flower development, leaves will begin to fall, and during the dormant winter rest, plants should be kept quite dry. Hybrids of this species require similar care.

Responding to members' requests, we sold some more big beautiful cattleyas from Hausermann's Orchids (www.orchidsbyhausermann.com).

In July, we are having a special event, our "Fifteen-Minute Solution," our new invention to share our expertise. We will have presentations going on at the same time in different spots in the meeting hall, and you will have the opportunity to attend four of the presentations, each fifteen-minutes long.

Clarice Dean-Species of the Month

ORCHIDS

The authors aptly subtitle this slender, 64-page book "A Romantic History With A Guide To Cultivation Arranged In Three Chapters". They succinctly summarize 2500 years of orchid history, then proceed to a discussion of the orchids, providing information on life-cycle, morphology, classification, and native habitats. Finally, they provide guidelines for orchid care and cultivation. All of this is done in a manner that is scholarly, yet intelligible even to the novice orchid grower. By relating cultural requirements to an orchid's native ecology, they render the often confusing subjects of media, light, feeding, etc. logical.

The book is written in straightforward, almost conversational prose and is well-illustrated in full color. The diminutive size of this 5"X8.5" volume makes it easily portable in pocket or purse. All in all, a delightful and practical little gem for any orchid lover.

The earliest portrait of Charles Darwin, Mea Allen relates, shows him at six clutching a pot of flowers. In an age of industrialization, Darwin found in flowers, and particularly in orchids, a study in the wonders of nature over the stream of time. We, too, clutching our pots of flowers, find in the mystique of orchids, in its fantastic diversity and flamboyant colors and shapes, a way out of the mundane and into the ethereal.

Why grow orchids? As Charles Darwin exulted,

They are wonderful creatures, these Orchids, and I sometimes think with a glow of pleasure, when I remember making out some little point...
You cannot conceive how the Orchids have delighted me...For the orchids are more play than work...


